Memorandum of Understanding between the Australasian Juvenile Justice Administrators (on behalf of states and territories) and the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare

Schedule

This Schedule is an agreement between the Australasian Juvenile Justice Administrators (AJJA) and the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW). The AIHW undertakes to perform the services detailed in this Schedule and the AJJA agrees to provide all agreed materials and any fees specified in this Schedule. This Schedule is agreed subject to the terms and conditions of the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between the AJJA and the AIHW and, upon signing, forms part of the MoU.

Management and collation of the Juvenile Justice National Minimum Data Set (JJ NMDS) and reporting of youth justice data for the period 2015–18

Start date: 1 July 2015

End date: 30 June 2018

Contents

Description of project

This Schedule relates to the management of the Juvenile Justice National Minimum Data Set (JJ NMDS), reporting on youth justice data including data from the JJ NMDS and the provision of secretariat support for the Juvenile Justice Research and Information Group (JJ RIG).

Term of project

This Schedule covers work from 1 July 2015 to 30 June 2018. This Schedule may be varied in accordance with the terms specified in the MoU for this Schedule.

Part A: AlHW obligations

Work program

The AIHW undertakes to meet a work program consisting of the following components:

- · secretariat support for the JJ RIG
- annual JJ NMDS data collection
- annual reports on youth justice data:
 - Youth justice in Australia
 - Youth detention population in Australia
 - Young people returning to sentenced youth justice supervision
 - Young people receiving child protection services and under youth justice supervision.

The outputs associated with these components are discussed in detail in the sections below. Specific timelines for the work program will be agreed between the AIHW and the JJ RIG at the face-to-face meeting each year, or as required.

1.1 JJ RIG Secretariat

The AIHW will provide secretariat support to the JJ RIG as detailed in Table A.1. At least one face-to-face JJ RIG meeting and two teleconferences will be held per year.

AIHW work on the JJ NMDS data collection covered by this Schedule excludes data development, such as the development of new data items or the significant revision of existing data specifications beyond the clarification of existing text. If data development

work is required, this will be negotiated and agreed by executing either a variation to this Schedule or a separate Schedule.

Part C: Financial arrangements

5 Financial arrangements

Participating jurisdictions undertake to pay the AIHW, according to the terms set out in the MoU between the AJJA and the AIHW, a total of \$1,118,114 (excluding GST) for services provided under this Schedule, for the 3-year period 2015–16 to 2017–18 (see Appendix A for details).

For 2015–16, the total cost to jurisdictions is \$352,219 (excluding GST). The AIHW will make an additional contribution of \$14,081 in 2015–16 only.

Costs are subject to a 3% increase in each year covered by this schedule.

Invoices for the work will be apportioned among the participating jurisdictions on the basis of the Australian Bureau of Statistics population estimates detailed in Appendix A to this Schedule.

6 Annual invoice

Participating jurisdictions will be invoiced on 1 July each year with payment terms according to the MoU.

This three-year schedule may extended by one or more years subject to the agreement of all parties in writing.
